

Goodrich Square Tour*		
	<i>This rusty object stands in front of a concrete block building originally constructed as a place to purchase farm equipment.</i>	
	<i>This has always been the place to go to prevent your teeth from turning the same shade of yellow as the building!</i>	
	<i>Former home of a music professor at the Milton College School of Music. She taught piano lessons there until 1970. You may be able to still hear the beautiful music playing if you stay as a "guest."</i>	
Merchant Row Historic District and Business District Tour*		
	<i>At this location you can hear the swinging of baseball bats or the horses assembling for the annual 4th of July Parade.</i>

	<p><i>This building doesn't look very unusual, but the "fellows" who originally occupied it were "odd." This Italianate style building is now home to various small businesses.</i></p>	
	<p><i>Recently placed on the National Register of Historic Places, built in 1916, it has the same purpose and occupants and you can still join their organization today. It's no secret this organization serves great fish!</i></p>	
	<p><i>This building features cast iron elements, including the cornice, and operated as a clothing store well into the 20th century. It was the place to go for men's clothing in the early 1900's.</i></p>	
	<p><i>Built in 1866, this building has unique Italianate style with an intact cupola and the original owner was a lumber merchant who helped build Milton.</i></p>	
Milton College Historic District and Residential Tour*		
	<p><i>When you enter this building you can hear the echoes of young adults attending classes. You can also take a self-guided tour down memory lane.</i></p>	
	<p><i>This is the only intact farmstead in the City limits. This property is on the National Register of Historic Places. Over the years, it was a dairy farm and later a fresh meat market.</i></p>
