A NOTE FROM THE CHIEF

I am proud to present to you the 2017 City of Milton Police Department Annual Activities Report.

As the charts at the end of the report indicate, we saw an increase this year over previous years in the number of calls for service we responded to in 2017. Unfortunately, two of those calls were particularly violent. In one case, a man fired a handgun in the presence of his children during a domestic dispute. He is currently in prison. The second call involved a man who was shot and killed by another man during a fight. In that case, the district attorney determined that with the evidence that existed, he would not be able to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the man did not act lawfully in self-defense. That man was arrested for homicide after the shooting, but was not formally charged and released from custody. While both crimes were violent and unusual for our department, I am extremely proud of my staff for the work they put into each investigation. I am also very grateful for the assistance of our area law enforcement partners who stepped in to assist us in these cases.

This year, we also transitioned to a new way of reporting crime information to the federal government. Our department, along with the other departments in Rock County, began transitioning from the Uniform Crime Report (UCR) method to the National Incident Based Report System (NIBRS). Describing all of the differences between the two programs would be too long for this report. However, the main difference is the level of detailed data entry that the NIBRS program requires. This transition was spearheaded by our Support Services Manager Becky Sexe. Her work resulted in our very successful transition to NIBRS.

In October, the department participated in a review of its policies and practices in an effort to maintain accreditation. The Milton Police Department first achieved accreditation by the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group (WILEAG) in October of 2014. In order to remain accredited, WILEAG conducts a review every three years to ensure compliance with all of the standards. Our three day site visit by WILEAG assessors was completed on October 19. On November 6, the WILEAG Board of Directors approved our accredited status for three years. Our next accreditation review will take place in October 2020. Receiving and maintaining accreditation is a huge undertaking for an agency of our size. We would not have been successful without the diligent work by our accreditation manager, Detective Ryan Justice.

I made some changes in the annual report this year to provide more statistical data regarding the work we do at the police department. If you have any questions about the data or wish to ask additional questions about our work, don't hesitate to give me a call to discuss further.

I'm proud of the work we did this year and remain humbled by the tremendous support we receive in our community. Thank you for supporting us in 2017 and into the future.

DEPARTMENT DESCRIPTION

The Milton Police Department is responsible for providing 24 hour police services and protection in the City of Milton. The department employs eleven full-time police officers, two part-time officers, and one full time support staff member. A second support staff member is the Milton Municipal Court clerk. Our court clerk spends 85% of her scheduled time dedicated to municipal court duties and 15% of scheduled time dedicated to the police department.

The police department believes strongly in community policing which is reflected in our organizational structure and enforcement philosophy. We believe in the critical importance of partnering with our community to identify and solve community problems so that we can maintain and enhance the quality of life in Milton. The department consists of three different programming areas: police administration, the patrol division and the support services division.

Police Administration:

Police Administration consists of Chief of Police Scott Marquardt and two lieutenants. Each lieutenant is responsible for supervision of a fixed shift or “team” of officers.

The chief is generally responsible for the following:

- Departmental control and direction
- Maintaining personnel and other resources of the department
- Budget development and maintenance
- Under the provisions of Wisconsin State law, specific authority in matters of operations and discipline
- The development and implementation of department rules and regulations, policy and procedures.
- Direct supervisor for the lieutenants and the clerical support team.

Administrative Lieutenant Mike Chesmore is generally responsible for the following:

- Coordinating the day to day operations schedule
- Training and development of all police officers in the department
- Assisting in budget maintenance
- Managing the maintenance of the vehicle fleet and officer equipment
- Court liaison officer to municipal court
- Direct supervision of the day team shift of officers, detective, and school resource officers
- Administrator for the body camera program

Operations Lieutenant Kevin Arneson is generally responsible for the following:

- Oversight of policy and procedure development and maintenance for the organization in coordination with the chief of police
- Court liaison officer to municipal court
- Supervision of the entire field training program for new officers, including

- supervision and policy development
- Oversight of the college internship program
- Assisting in budget maintenance
- Management of the evidence and property function, to include managing the evidence storage facility and processes
- Direct supervisor of the afternoon and night shift team of officers
- Creation and maintenance of the patrol schedule

Patrol Division:

The patrol division is made up of three teams of officers, divided by the shifts they work. Officers are deployed in permanent shifts which make up the day team, the afternoon team and the night team. The day shift team has two patrol officers and two sworn specialty positions. Both afternoon and night shifts each have two patrol officers. Patrol coverage is also supplemented by the two lieutenants. Each shift has officers with specialized training designed to enhance the level of service to our residents. A breakdown of each shift team and specialized training is provided below:

Day Shift Team (4 Full-Time Sworn Officers)

- Detective Ryan Justice is responsible for follow-up on all criminal investigations reported to the patrol division from all 3 shifts. The position also serves as our agency accreditation manager, Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task force representative and point person on a number of projects.
- Patrol Officer Jim Schumacher serves as a day shift patrol officer. His additional duties include salvage inspections upon behalf of the department and also serves as a firearms and spike strip instructor. He is a field training officer and a part time school resource officer at the Milton Middle School.
- School Resource Officers (SRO) Jim Martin (Spring 2017) and Ryan Schneider (Fall 2017) served as the direct liaison between the Milton School District and the City of Milton Police Department. The Milton School District serves a student population of over 3,600 students and 400 staff members. This sworn assignment is responsible for investigating incidents taking place at school and follow-up with students on other types of incidents. In addition, the SRO provides proactive programming in the classroom and is a positive law enforcement presence during the school day and at co-curricular events. The SRO is a cost-shared position with all personnel expenses paid by the Milton School District when the officer is acting in an SRO capacity.

SRO Martin retired at the end of the 2016-2017 school year on June 7, 2017. After a selection process, Officer Schneider was selected to replace Officer Martin as the next full time SRO. A vacancy was then created in patrol. Officer Jared Fish joined the department on October 30, 2017 to fill that vacancy.

- Patrol Officer Kyle Johnson serves as a day shift patrol officer. Officer Johnson is also a field training officer. Officer Johnson is coordinator the department's participation in state wide traffic safety initiatives, such as Click It or Ticket and Booze and Belts. Officer Johnson's work has resulted in equipment grant awards totaling \$20,000 in recent years. He also serves as an evidence technician.

Afternoon Shift Team (2 Full-Time Sworn Officers)

- Patrol Officer Ryan Spangler serves as an evening shift patrol officer. He is also a trained evidence technician and a part time Rock County Special Investigations Unit (SIU) member.
- Patrol Officer Joe Fox serves as an evening shift patrol officer and is responsible for responding to calls for service on the afternoon shift of officers.

Officer Fox left us on March 17, 2017 for a full time position with the Janesville Police Department. Officer Corey Passer joined the department to replace Officer Fox on April 3, 2017.

Night Shift Team (2 Full-Time Sworn Officers)

- Patrol Officer Justin Geske is our newest full time officer and successfully completed probation at the end of 2016.
- Before his appointment as School Resource Officer in Fall 2017, Patrol Officer Ryan Schneider served as a night shift patrol officer. He is also an evidence technician and assists Lieutenant Arneson in the property and evidence control function for the department.

Part Time Officers

- To assist with meeting minimum staffing needs on patrol, the police department also employs part time officers. The part time officers are fully sworn police officers who have completed the same hiring and training requirements as full time officers.
- In calendar year 2017, the part time officers were Blaine Larson and Chris Hughes.

Support Division:

Code Enforcement Officer

Officer Blaine Larson serves as the police code enforcement officer for the City of Milton. He works cooperatively with the Department of Public Works on nearly all code enforcement activities. In 2017, we fully implemented a new record keeping system for code violations. This ensured that all individual code violations were properly documented, as was all of the follow up related to code violations. This

record keeping change has resulted in a drastic statistical increase in the number of overall code violations over prior years. In 2017, total code violations and follow up work was 1,177 calls for service. It's important to note that while these 1,177 calls for service have been documented in the police department's record management system, the work itself may have been completed Department of Public Works employees, Officer Larson or a combination of both. In addition to his code enforcement duties, Officer Larson also coordinates with regional public and private partners in documenting, classifying and disposing of items dropped off at our prescription drug drop box. In 2017, more than 634 pounds of material was properly disposed of. This is a 31 percent increase over the 2016 total of 484 pounds.

Clerical Support

Support Services Manager Becky Sexe is generally responsible for the following:


- Coordinating records management at the police department
- Routing numerous documents to various agencies requiring them such as the district attorney's office, health and human service departments and outside agency requests
- Coordinates and supervises the crossing guard program
- Coordinates equipment purchases and payroll
- Assisting in budget maintenance
- Typing of dictated officer reports
- Answering non-emergency telephone calls during business hours
- Processing walk in complaints
- Processing fine payments

Municipal Court Clerk Kris Klubertanz is generally responsible for the following:

- Typing of dictated officer reports
- Answering non-emergency telephone calls during business hours
- Processing walk in complaints
- Processing fine payments
- Records processing and management
- Direct liaison between the Milton Police Department and the Milton Municipal Court
- Managing Milton Municipal Court duties

Programming Activities

School Resource Officer Program:

Officer Jim Martin, the Milton Police Department School Resource Officer (SRO), is assigned to the schools (primarily the high school) on a full time basis, except during the summer break. Officer Martin has been very effective at student outreach and education that has made the environment at the schools better by his presence. In the 2016-2017 school year he made 9 class presentations, attended 48 school events in uniform, attended 22 school staff meetings, and had 497 conferences with students. Conferences with students are an effective way to counsel students and redirect inappropriate behavior, as well as fostering a positive relationship between law enforcement and the school population. Beyond preventive education and counseling, Officer Martin filed 79 incident reports, made 68 arrests, and wrote 32 traffic/parking tickets. The arrests were made for a variety of offenses including truancy, disorderly conduct, fighting, possession of a dangerous weapon, possession of drugs, theft, resisting arrest, unlawful use of a computer, battery, harassment and tobacco possession. Officer Martin retired from law enforcement at the end of the school year on June 7, 2017. We wish him well on his well-earned retirement.

Other Initiatives:

Improved Communication through Technology: The department continues expand its community outreach through the use of Facebook. The department has 3,759 followers on our Facebook page. This is a 9% increase from our 3,454 followers in 2016. We have used Facebook to provide information to the community on a wide variety of topics, from emergency preparedness to crime alerts.

The police department continues to be a popular destination for those using the City of Milton's website. Citizens can submit a crime tip to the Janesville Area Crime Stoppers (of which Milton is a part of) on our website. We also host an internet based "Bully Alert" reporting system. We work collaboratively with the Milton School District on following up on reports of bullying within our community. We are fortunate to have a strong relationship with our community's newspaper, the Milton Courier, which helps us communicate trends or noted areas of public safety concern.

Crime Prevention: The Milton Police Department doesn't only focus on taking crime reports, but includes crime prevention as part of its mission. The department is committed to the development and fostering of community based crime prevention efforts. Specific crime prevention efforts include Crime Stoppers, National Night Out, Lunch with a Cop at Northside Intermediate School, and numerous safety and education presentations on a wide variety of topics.

Employee Training:

All of our officers received and qualified in state regulated and mandated firearms training. All officers also received specialized training of their choosing so that they could enhance their skills as officers. This training included how to properly approach vehicles, interviewing, drug trends, implicit bias and numerous other topics.

Department Awards:

Officer Blaine Larson was selected as Officer of the Year for 2017.

Accountability to Our Citizens:

Internal Affairs Investigations:

While not a formal complaint, the Milton Police Department received pointed criticism on Facebook from a local resident who was very upset with the traffic citations he received. The complainant was encouraged to file a formal complaint, but refused to do so. Even without a formal complaint, the complainant's allegations were still investigated and determined to be unfounded.

The Chief of Police also spoke with a local citizen that was displeased with the investigation of a property damage traffic accident. The citizen, the investigating officer and the chief met to discuss the concerns. While no violations of policy or procedure occurred, areas of improvement for future accident investigations were identified.

No other citizen complaints were received in 2017.

Use of Force:

The Milton Police Department had fifteen documented use of force incidents in 2017 involving ten juveniles, four adults and one injured/sick animal. Nine incidents involved use of force to make an arrest. Five incidents involved a person who wanted to hurt themselves.

In ten incidents, officers effectively used escort/compliance holds to make an arrest or to prevent self-harm. In the five other incidents, escort/compliance holds were not effective in making an arrest or preventing self-harm and are described below.

In three cases, the officer used decentralization or a wall stun to take a person into custody. This involves physically moving the subject to the ground or into a fixed object where they are under control and handcuffed. The first incident involved a subject that tried to tackle the officer and after two wall stuns the subject was taken into custody. The second incident involved a subject who had continually resisted and after a wall stun they were taken into custody. The third incident involved a subject who kept trying to walk away from the hospital while in police custody who was then decentralized to the ground.

In two cases, the officer deployed a firearm. In one incident, the officer dispatched a sick/injured animal. In the other incident, the officer deployed his firearm while making contact with a suicidal subject in a vehicle who may have had a weapon. The handgun was holstered once no threat was determined.

Only one suspect complained of minor injury after all of the use of force incidents. He was seen by medical personnel and it was determined there was no injury.

Administrative Lieutenant Michael Chesmore formally reviews all use of force situations in the department. He deemed that the each officers' actions were appropriate for the circumstances they were faced with. In every case, the officers used the minimum amount of force necessary to control the subjects. In all cases, officers were in compliance with department policy and procedures, training, and state and federal laws.

Budget:

The Milton Police Department budget was \$1,209,396 in 2017. The department expenditures were \$60,843, or 5%, less than the budgeted amount with the remaining balance returned to the general fund. The bulk of the budget savings were on the salary and health insurance line items. The department budget is used primarily for personnel expenses with 97.8% of the budget devoted to payroll, benefits and overtime for our employees.

ACTIVITY REPORT

The following pages contain three charts documenting different data sets that we maintain as statistical measures of our work:

- Calls for Service, 2014-2017
 - The data in this report is created from all call types entered into the Rock County 911 Center's computer aided dispatch (CAD) system, incorporating data from the countywide Spillman Records Management System.
 - The highlights in some cells of the chart have the following meaning:
 - Green: number of calls in that type have gone up
 - Red: number of calls in that type have gone down
 - Yellow: number of calls in that type have gone up greater than 200%
- 2017 Citation Totals by Offense
 - Every written citation issued by the department in 2017, both ordinance citations and traffic citations.
 - Each of these citations were processed through the City of Milton Municipal Court.
- 2017 Criminal Arrests
 - Every criminal arrest the department made of juveniles and adults in 2017.
 - An arrest by the police department does not always result in a criminal charge or conviction. All persons taken into custody are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.
