## **A NOTE FROM THE CHIEF**

I am proud to present to you the 2018 City of Milton Police Department Annual Activities Report.

As the charts at the end of the report indicate, we once again saw an increase over previous years in the number of calls for service we responded to in 2018. Some of that increase is due to more consistently capturing the work we do, especially when it comes to code enforcement and security checks. However, an analysis of the data when removing code enforcement, security checks and business checks still shows an 8% increase in calls over 2017. With the community growth in both residential and business sectors, I predict that our total calls will continue to steadily increase in the coming years.

The department had some structural changes in 2018. On April 1, Operations Lieutenant Kevin Arneson retired. He had served the City of Milton for nine years and had an additional nine and a half years with the Rock County Sheriff's Department earlier in his career. We continue to wish him well. His departure left a vacancy in the supervisor level of the department. It also gave us the chance to restructure the command staff. We re-named the Operations Lieutenant to Patrol Lieutenant and the Administrative Lieutenant, held by Michael Chesmore, to Deputy Chief. We then held a promotional process to fill the Patrol Lieutenant position. On July 1<sup>st</sup>, Kyle Johnson was promoted to the Patrol Lieutenant position. The promotion and an additional officer resignation resulted in two officer hiring processes. Our two newest officers are Heather Peck and Andy Ries.

In last year's annual report, I introduced our new method of reporting crime information to the federal government. Our department, along with the other departments in Rock County, began transitioning from the Uniform Crime Report (UCR) method to the National Incident Based Report System (NIBRS). Describing all of the differences between the two programs would be too long for this report. However, the main difference is the level of detailed data entry that the NIBRS program requires. This transition at both the local and county level was spearheaded by our Support Services Manager Becky Sexe. After a year of tedious work, trial and error, we were notified on February 22, 2019 that we have been certified as a NIBRS program participant. At the end of 2018, only 39% of the agencies in the State of Wisconsin and 43% nationwide have been NIBRS certified. All agencies in the nation are required to transition to NIBRS by 2021. I am so grateful for the work Becky has done to put us ahead of the curve and make certification possible.

The 2018 Annual Report will follow the same format as 2017, continuing with the inclusion of more statistical data regarding the work we do at the police department. If you have any questions about the data or wish to ask additional questions about our work, don't hesitate to give me a call to discuss further.

I'm proud of the work we did this year and remain humbled by the tremendous support we receive in our community. Thank you for supporting us in 2018 and into the future.

## **DEPARTMENT DESCRIPTION**

The Milton Police Department is responsible for providing 24 hour police services and protection in the City of Milton. The department employs eleven full-time police officers, two part-time officers, and one full time support staff member. A second support staff member is also the Milton Municipal Court clerk. Our court clerk spends 85% of her scheduled time dedicated to municipal court duties and 15% of scheduled time dedicated to the police department.

The police department believes strongly in community policing which is reflected in our organizational structure and enforcement philosophy. We believe in the critical importance of partnering with our community to identify and solve community problems so that we can maintain and enhance the quality of life in Milton. The department consists of three different areas: police administration, patrol, and support services.

### **Police Administration:**

Police Administration consists of Chief of Police Scott Marquardt, Deputy Chief Michael Chesmore and Patrol Lieutenant Kyle Johnson. Each member of the administrative staff is responsible for supervision of select employees.

The Chief of Police is generally responsible for the following:

- Departmental control and direction
- Maintaining personnel and other resources of the department
- Budget development and maintenance
- Under the provisions of Wisconsin State law, specific authority in matters of operations and discipline
- The development and implementation of department rules, regulations, policy and procedures.
- Direct supervision of the Deputy Chief, Patrol Lieutenant, Detective, clerical support team and crossing guards.

The Deputy Chief is generally responsible for the following:

- Supporting daily administrative operations
- Training and development of all police officers in the department
- Assisting in budget maintenance
- Managing the maintenance of the vehicle fleet and officer equipment
- Court liaison officer to municipal court
- Direct supervision of day shift officers, school resource officers, and code enforcement officer
- Oversight of the evidence and property function, to include managing the evidence storage facility and processes
- Administrator for the body camera program
- Serving as acting chief in the absence of the Chief of Police

The Patrol Lieutenant is generally responsible for the following:

- Direct supervisor of the afternoon and night shift team of officers during his scheduled shift of 6:30 p.m. to 3 a.m.
- Court liaison officer to municipal court
- Supervision of the entire field training program for new officers, including

- supervision and policy development
- Assisting in budget maintenance
- Creation and maintenance of the patrol schedule
- Serving as acting chief in the absence of the Chief of Police and the Deputy Chief.

**Patrol Division:**

The patrol division consists of three teams of officers working designated shifts: days (1<sup>st</sup> Shift), afternoons (2<sup>nd</sup> Shift), and nights (3<sup>rd</sup> Shift).

***1<sup>st</sup> Shift: 4 Full-Time Sworn Officers***

- Patrol Officer Jim Schumacher serves as a day shift patrol officer. His additional duties include salvage inspections and a staff instructor in firearms and spike strip use. He is a field training officer and a part time school resource officer at the Milton Middle School.
- Detective Ryan Justice is responsible for the investigation of serious crimes and follow-up on select investigations that have been reported to the patrol division. Detective Justice also serves as our agency accreditation manager, the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task force representative and a point person on a number of projects.
- Patrol Officer Ryan Spangler serves as a day shift patrol officer. He is a trained evidence technician and a part time member of the Rock County Special Investigations Unit (SIU). Officer Spangler is also a field training officer.
- School Resource Officer (SRO) Ryan Schneider is posted to the Milton School District, primarily Milton High School, when school is in session. The Milton School District serves a student population of over 3,600 students and 400 staff members. This sworn assignment is responsible for investigating incidents taking place at school and follow-up with students on other types of incidents. In addition, the SRO provides proactive programming in the classroom and is a positive law enforcement presence during the school day and at co-curricular events. The SRO is a cost-shared position with all personnel expenses paid by the Milton School District when the officer is acting in an SRO capacity. Officer Schneider is also the department's evidence custodian and an evidence technician.

***2<sup>nd</sup> Shift: 2 Full-Time Sworn Officers***

- Patrol Officer Justin Geske serves as an evening shift patrol officer. He is also a trained evidence technician.
- Patrol Officer Corey Passer was an evening shift patrol officer until his resignation to pursue other opportunities in June 2018. He was replaced by Officer Heather Peck.

***3<sup>rd</sup> Shift: 2 Full-Time Sworn Officers***

- Patrol Officer Jared Fish is a night shift patrol officer. He is also the new coordinator of the department's participation in state wide traffic safety

initiatives, such as Click It or Ticket and Booze and Belts. Together with the prior coordinator, Lieutenant Johnson, their work has resulted in equipment grant awards totaling more than \$20,000 in recent years.

- Patrol Officer Andy Ries is our newest officer, joining the department in September 2018.

#### ***Part Time Officers: 2 Part-Time Sworn Officers***

- To assist with meeting minimum staffing needs on patrol, the police department also employs part time officers. The part time officers are fully sworn police officers who have completed the same hiring and training requirements as full time officers.
- In calendar year 2018, the part time officers were Blaine Larson and Chris Hughes.

### **Support Services:**

#### ***Code Enforcement Officer: Part-Time Sworn Officer***

Officer Blaine Larson serves as the part time police code enforcement officer for the City of Milton. He works approximately 20 hours a week. He works cooperatively with the Department of Public Works on nearly all code enforcement activities. It is crucial to note that while the code enforcement calls for service have been tracked and documented in the police department's record management system, the work itself may have been completed Department of Public Works employees, Officer Larson or a combination of both. In addition to his code enforcement duties, Officer Larson also coordinates with regional public and private partners in documenting, classifying and disposing of items dropped off at our prescription drug drop box. In 2018, more than 571 pounds of material was properly disposed of. This is a 10 percent decrease from the 2017 total of approximately 634 pounds.

#### ***Clerical Support: 1.15 Full-Time Non-Sworn Employees***

Support Services Manager Becky Sexe is a full time employee generally responsible for the following:

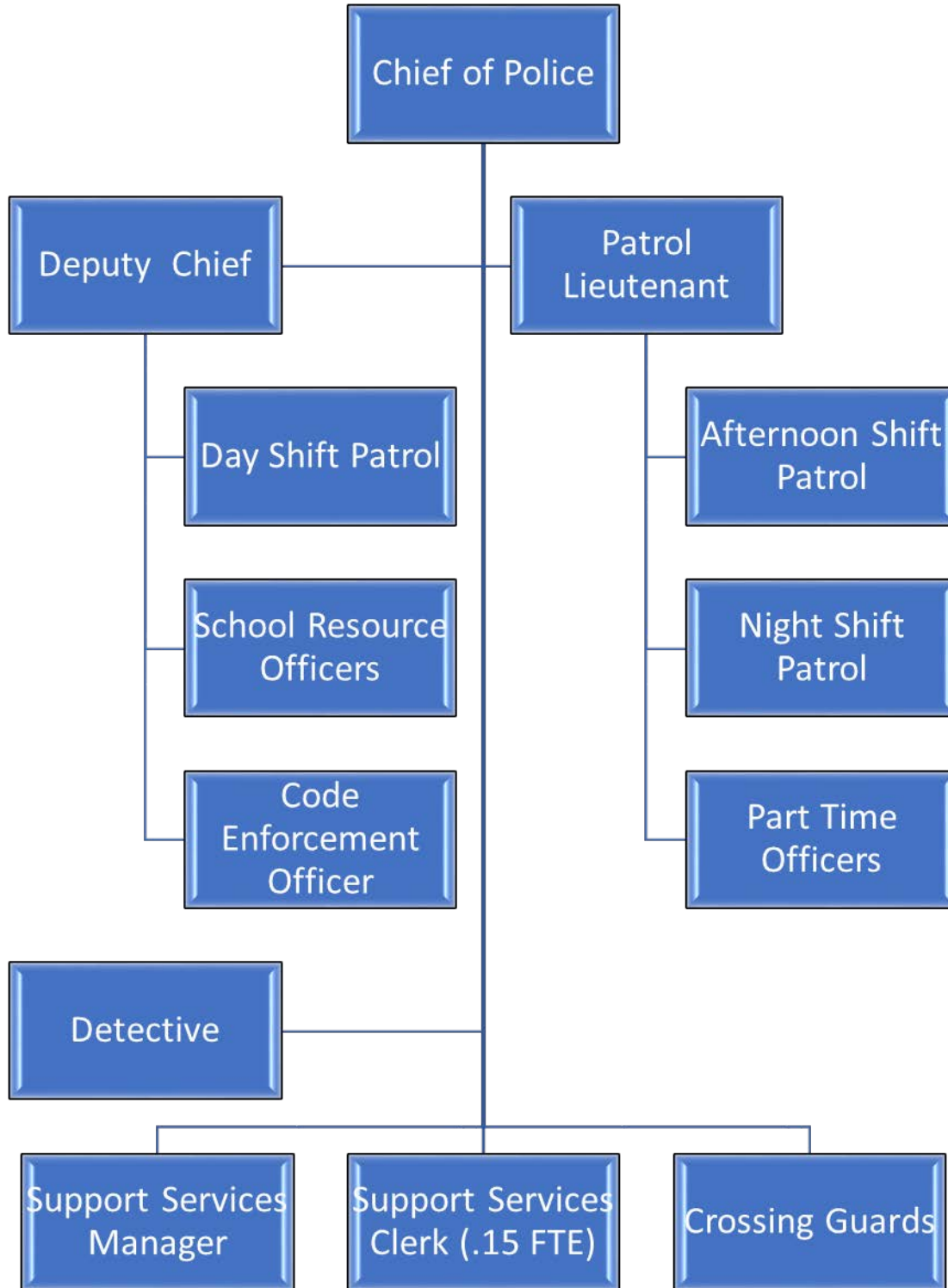
- Coordinating records management at the police department
- Routing numerous documents to various agencies requiring them such as the district attorney's office, health and human service departments and outside agency requests
- Coordinates equipment purchases and payroll
- Assisting in budget maintenance
- Typing of dictated officer reports
- Answering non-emergency telephone calls during business hours
- Processing walk in complaints
- Processing fine payments

Municipal Court Clerk Kris Klubertanz is a full time employee of the City, but her time is split between the Municipal Court (85%) and the police department (15%) In her police department support function, she is generally responsible for the following:

- Typing of dictated officer reports
- Answering non-emergency telephone calls during business hours
- Processing walk in complaints
- Processing fine payments
- Records processing and management
- Direct liaison between the Milton Police Department and the Milton Municipal Court

## Programming Activities

### **School Resource Officer Program:**

Officer Ryan Schneider, the Milton Police Department School Resource Officer (SRO), is assigned to the schools (primarily the high school) on a full time basis, except during school breaks. Officer Schneider has been very effective at student outreach and education that has made the environment at the schools better by his presence. In the 2017-2018 school year he did 42 class presentations, attended 24 school events in uniform, and had 832 conferences with students. Conferences with students are an effective way to counsel students and redirect inappropriate behavior, as well as fostering a positive relationship between law enforcement and the school population. Beyond preventive education and counseling, Officer Schneider filed 86 incident reports, made 66 arrests, and wrote 10 traffic/parking tickets. The arrests were made for a variety of offenses including truancy, disorderly conduct, possession of a dangerous weapon, possession of drugs, theft, resisting arrest, unlawful use of a computer, battery, harassment and tobacco possession.

Officer Jim Schumacher is assigned to the middle school on a part time basis, averaging just a handful of hours each week. Given the limited hours and the age of the population, Officer Schumacher doesn't handle the same volume or seriousness of calls at the middle school as Officer Schneider does at the high school. However, he has managed many of the same type of incidents and is an important presence at the middle school.

### **Other Initiatives:**

#### ***Improved Communication through Technology:***

The department continues expand its community outreach through the use of Facebook. The department has 3,900 followers on our Facebook page, up slightly from our 3,759 at the same time last year. We have used Facebook to provide information to the community on a wide variety of topics, from emergency preparedness to crime alerts.

The police department continues to be a popular destination for those using the City of Milton's website. Citizens can submit a crime tip to the Janesville Area Crime Stoppers (of which Milton is a part of) on our website. We also host an internet based "Bully Alert" reporting system. We work collaboratively with the Milton School District on following up on reports of bullying within our community. We are fortunate to have a strong relationship with our community's newspaper, the Milton Courier, which helps us communicate trends or noted areas of public safety concern.

***Crime Prevention:*** The Milton Police Department doesn't only focus on taking crime reports, but includes crime prevention as part of its mission. The department is committed to the development and fostering of community based



crime prevention efforts. Specific crime prevention efforts include Crime Stoppers, National Night Out, Lunch with a Cop at Northside Intermediate School, and numerous safety and education presentations on a wide variety of topics.

### **Employee Training:**

All of our officers received and qualified in state regulated and mandated firearms training. All officers also received specialized training of their choosing so that they could enhance their skills as officers. This training included how to properly approach vehicles, interviewing, drug trends, implicit bias and numerous other topics.

### **Accountability to Our Citizens:**

#### ***Internal Affairs Investigations:***

A single internal affairs investigation took place in 2018 related to a concern that an officer was misusing city resources. The investigation revealed that there was no misconduct whatsoever and the officer was completely exonerated.

#### ***Use of Force:***

The Milton Police Department had nineteen documented use of force incidents in 2018. These incidents involved three juveniles, twelve adults and four injured/sick animals. Eight of the incidents in 2018 involved use of force to make an arrest. Seven of the other incidents involved protecting oneself or another.

Details of the force used:

- Five incidents involved escort/compliance holds to make an arrest or to prevent self-harm.
- In five incidents, escort/compliance holds were not effective. In order to make an arrest or prevent self-harm, the officer then needed to move to another arrest tactic. In all five of these incidents, the tactic performed by the officer is called decentralization. Decentralization involves physically moving the subject to the ground or against a fixed object to get them under control and safely handcuffed.
  - One incident involved an arrest after the subject struck an officer.
  - Two incidents involved subjects that charged at officers.
  - One incident involved a juvenile that was experiencing a mental health crisis and needed medical treatment for a bloody nose.
  - One incident involved a subject resisting arrest after punching out a window and fleeing from officers.
- Five incidents involved the officer displaying his or handgun for protection of themselves or another. The firearm was not used. However, we consider even the display of a handgun as a use of force to be documented and tracked.
  - Four incidents involved conducting a high risk traffic stop where a person in a vehicle was reported to be armed or had a firearm in the vehicle.
  - One incident involved an officer deploying his handgun to search clear a residence during a check welfare.

- Finally, four incidents involved the discharge of a firearm in order to dispatch a sick or injured animal.

None of the individuals involved in these instances of force received any injuries.

Deputy Chief Michael Chesmore conducts a formal review of all use of force incidents in the department. He deemed that each officers' actions were appropriate for the circumstances they were faced with. In every case, the officers used the minimum amount of force necessary to control the subjects and were in compliance with department policy and procedures, training, and state and federal laws.

**Budget:**

The Milton Police Department budget was \$1,255,084.00 in 2018. The department expenditures were \$ 147,797.19, or 11.8%, less than the budgeted amount, with the remaining balance returned to the general fund. The bulk of the budget savings were on the salary and health insurance line items due to the employee vacancies in 2018. As with any municipal organization, the police department budget largely consists of personnel expenses with 93.8% of the budget devoted to wages and benefits of our employees.

## ACTIVITY REPORT

The following pages contain three charts documenting different data sets that we maintain as statistical measures of our work:

- Calls for Service, 2014-2018
  - The data in this report is created from all call types entered into the Rock County 911 Center's computer aided dispatch (CAD) system, incorporating data from the countywide Spillman Records Management System.
  - The highlights in some cells of the chart have the following meaning:
    - Green: number of calls in that type have gone up
    - Red: number of calls in that type have gone down
    - Yellow: number of calls in that type have gone up greater than 200%
- 2018 Citation Totals by Offense
  - Every written citation issued by the department in 2018, both ordinance citations and traffic forfeiture citations.
  - Each of these citations were processed through the City of Milton Municipal Court.
- 2018 Criminal Arrests
  - Every criminal arrest the department made of juveniles and adults in 2018.
  - An arrest by the police department does not always result in a criminal charge or conviction. All persons taken into custody are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

The Wisconsin Department of Justice also collects crime statistics from throughout the state on specific types of crimes. You can see that data at:
